



The bride, who is so well known to the people of Evansville, was dressed in a gown of black silk grenadine with royal blue flowers, and trimmed with duchess lace, and looked very charming. The groom, who is also well known here, is superintendent of the experimental department of the Deering Harvester Co., at Deering, (Chicago.) The happy couple were the recipients of many useful and beautiful presents; after the ceremony, an elaborate supper was served.

He became master mechanic at the Fairbanks-Morse plant in Beloit and was later transferred to the company's plant at Toronto. He was married to Miss Eva Ainsworth, Juda, in Beloit, who survives with three sons, Victor, LeRoy, and Robert, all of Canada; one granddaughter; four brothers, Richard, Aurora, Neb.; W. J. Ahara, Evansville; Edwin, Mishawauka, Ind.; and Theodore, Peoria, Ill.; two sisters, Mrs. Rachel Aller, Wakefield, Neb.; and Mrs. Jennie West, Portland, Ore. Funeral services are being held in Toronto today.
