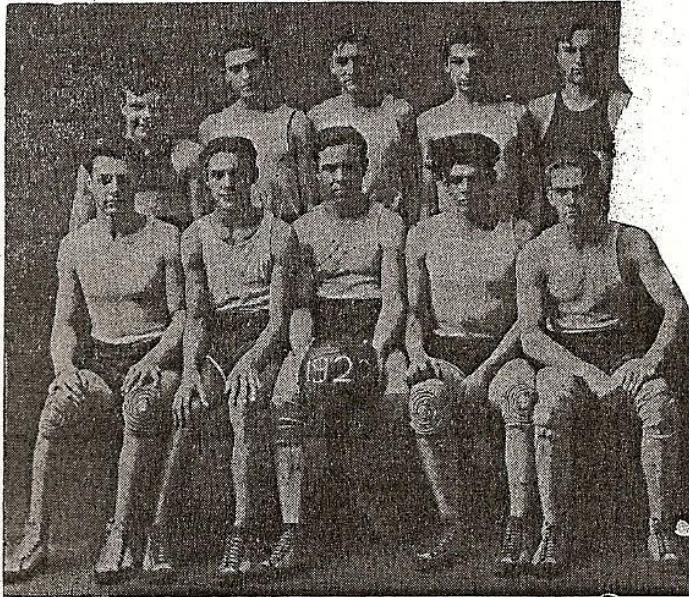

HOME TEAM ENTERS TOURNAMENT WITH AN ALMOST PERFECT SCORE

Will Go to Whitewater Tournament With Excellent Show of Winning Not Only First Place in Tournament but Also Place in State Association Tournament

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**A. M. BARNUM WILL
OBSERVE BIRTHDAY**

**Lifelong Resident of Locality
Will be 83 Monday; Born in
Albany July 17, 1856**

A. M. Barnum, a lifelong resident of this locality who is now confined to a Janesville sanitarium, will quietly observe his eighty-third birthday there Monday.

Mr. Barnum was born in Albany July 17, 1856 and came to Evansville with his mother when seven years of age. His father had died two years previous in the Civil war.

Mr. Barnum was married in Madison in 1879 to Miss Luella Reckord, aunt of Postmaster Roy Reckord. Mrs. Barnum died 16 years ago after which Mr. Barnum resided for eight years in Milwaukee.

He has one daughter, Mrs. Walter Apfel, this city; a son, Charles Barnum, Madison, former Evansville resident; a sister, Mrs. George Wolfe, Madison, also formerly of Evansville; and three grandchildren, Perry Apfel, Couderay; Robert Apfel, son of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Apfel, this city; and Rolland Barnum, Madison; and several great grandchildren.

Daughter of Former Evansville Residents Killed Friday; Burial Here Tuesday

Miss Gloria Barnum, 16, Rockford, Ill., daughter of the late Oliver Barnum and Mrs. Nellie Clifton Barnum, former local residents and granddaughter of Mrs. Sophia Barnum, Rockford, who also formerly resided here was instantly killed Friday night, nine miles west of Aurora, Ill., when she was returning to Rockford from a high school football game in Aurora.

Funeral services were held Tuesday p.m. in the Second Congregational church in Rockford with Dr. John Gordon, pastor of the church officiating. Brief burial services were held here in Maple Hill cemetery Tuesday afternoon.

Fred Ogilby, Rockford, was also a victim of the accident and Miss Patricia Palmer is in a critical condition in the hospital. Two other occupants of the car were injured but not seriously.

She was a junior in the West High school at Rockford and was an R.O.T.C. sponsor last year. She was a niece of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Broughton, who reside on a farm west of this city.

Graveside services, arranged by the Allen Funeral Home, were held Sunday afternoon in Maple Hill Cemetery for Mrs. Rilla Barnum Brown, 82, of Rockford, former Evansville resident, who died last Friday at Caravilla.

Mrs. Brown, daughter of the late Fred and Sophia Barnum, was born in Evansville, Feb. 22, 1886. She attended the Evansville school. Following her marriage she resided in Rockford. Mr. Brown died several years ago. Her only survivor is a son, William Brown, Rockford.
