

'CAL' BROUGHTON DAY, APRIL 25

Evansville to Honor Old Ball Player at Opening League Game Here Sunday.

Next Sunday, April 25, Evansville's opening date in the reorganized Southern Wisconsin Baseball League, has been designated as "Cal" Broughton Day, in honor of the famous old local player who was one of the best catchers in his time. At 2:30 Sunday afternoon Evansville will open its 1926 ball season at the Fair Grounds diamond with the Janesville Boosters, league champs last year.

As this is Evansville's first season in organized baseball, a large crowd is expected to attend the opening game. Features of the opening day will be music by the Evansville band, the throwing of the first ball by Mayor Libby to "Cal," and the big game between Janesville and Evansville.

About thirty candidates for the local team were out Sunday and played a six inning practice game. The boys did some heavy hitting, but the wind was so cold that the pitchers did not open up much. Carns, Paquette, Brunsell, and Cain each worked on the mound awhile.

Manager Collins is having practice every night this week, hoping to find a smooth playing combination to start against Janesville. Evansville's lineup is uncertain, but will probably be picked from the following: Carns, Paquette, Gunlock, Brunsell, pitchers; Helgesen, Lamboley, Anderson, catchers; Anderson, Covert, Furseth, Libby, Seipp, Smith, Zwickey, infielders; Braclaus, T. LOCAL MEN REPRESENT STATE ORGANIZATION

Evansville Group Is Soliciting Membership for Wisconsin Wool Growers' Assoc.

A committee composed of H. H. Robinson, W. N. Porter, John Knudson, and Marvin Ellingson, Evansville; and Harry Broughton, Albany, is at work signing up membership for the recently organized Wisconsin Wool Growers' Co-operative association, according to information just received from William F. Renk, commissioner of agriculture and markets.

Active organization work is proceeding in all the wool growing sections of Wisconsin for the purpose of signing up wool to be marketed through the National Wool Marketing corporation. Under this plan of marketing, the growers deliver their wool and mohair to the state co-operative association of growers which in turn delivers the product to the National Wool Marketing corporation.

More than 22 large wool growers' organizations in the country have so far joined the national corporation which is controlling over 60,000,000 pounds of wool.

ROY BROUGHTON DIES AT HOME; HAD GAINED BROAD RECOGNITION

Roy Broughton, 54, Magnolia town chairman for the last twelve years, and former president of the Wisconsin Shropshire Breeders association, died at 8:30 a.m. Tuesday at his farm home after a serious illness of a month.

He was born in the old Broughton home on the Rock-Green county line Feb. 3, 1883, the son of Arthur and Alice Longfield Broughton, and married Jessamin Randall, Albany, October 25, 1902.

He was one of four brothers who own the three adjoining Hickory Dale farms totaling 520 acres under the firm name A. Broughton's Sons. Others are Harry, Calvin, and Lynn Broughton. Shropshires from their nationally known flock were entered in the International Livestock exposition at Chicago every year since 1913, and in 1917 took practically all the prizes.

Aaron Broughton, his grandfather, started the sheep herd, and his father, Arthur, developed the Broughton Shropshire sheep, serving as president of the American Shropshire Breeders association, and receiving University of Wisconsin honors for his contribution to the industry.

Survivors include his wife; a daughter, Pauline, at home; his mother, Mrs. Alice Broughton, and a sister, Mrs. Orville Jones, both of Evansville; and three brothers, all of Magnolia township.

Funeral services will be at 2 p.m. Thursday in the Atherton funeral home, Albany, with Rev. A. B. Crouse, Aurora, Ill., former Advent Christian church pastor at Magnolia, officiating. Robert Erstad, Evansville, will sing, with Mrs. Nellie Towns, Albany, at the piano. Pallbearers will be John and Eliot Fraser, William Finneran, and James Rowley, Magnolia; Ernest A. Silverthorn, and Miles Clark, Footville.

Calvert C. Broughton, 78, former chief of police here, prominent old time baseball player, and one of Evansville's most beloved citizens, died at 12:20 a.m. Wednesday in the home of his nephew and niece, Officer and Mrs. Orville Jones, 34 South Madison street, following a stroke suffered six weeks ago.

Mr. Broughton had been an invalid for three years and had spent the greater part of that time in bed where he remained helpless but retained his cheerful disposition.

Funeral services will be held at 2 p.m. Friday in the Allen funeral home with the Rev. E. L. Woodworth, pastor of the Magnolia Advent Christian church, officiating.

The song service will be presented by William Wood who will sing "Beautiful Isle of Somewhere" accompanied at the piano by Miss Bernardine Gillman. Burial will be made in Maple Hill cemetery with Harry, Lynn, and Calvert Broughton, Doctors Seth and Calvert Cain, and Arthur Cain as pallbearers.

Mr. Broughton, son of the late Aaron and Linda Broughton, was born on the Broughton farm, eight miles south of Evansville, Dec. 23, 1860 and grew to young manhood in that locality.

He was married to Miss Harriet Chase, Cainville, at a double wedding ceremony with the late Mr. and Mrs. George Henry Howard performed in the old Grand hotel, Janesville, Dec.

14, 1881 by the Rev. A. J. Brill, Methodist minister of Footville.

After enjoying a wedding trip to Milwaukee, Mr. and Mrs. Broughton settled on the Broughton farm where they resided until 1895 when they came to Evansville. They celebrated their Golden Wedding anniversary here in 1931 when they were guests of honor at a surprise party given in their home by a group of relatives and were dinner guests that day of Mr. Broughton's sister, Mrs. Clyde McCoy, 310 Almeron street. They were recipient of a purse of money and many attractive gifts.

Prominent in professional baseball, Mr. Broughton at one time was a catcher for some of the leading ball clubs in the country including Milwaukee, St. Paul, Cleveland, Memphis, and the St. Louis Browns.

While playing with the Memphis team he was awarded a gold medal for his efficiency which he prized as

billiard parlor from the late Ralph Smith then located east of the Farmers and State bank in the building recently vacated by the Jensen Billiard parlor.

He was later elected chief of police here which position he held for 17 years. After several years' employment at the plant of the D. E. Wood Butter company, he accepted a position here as assistant chief of police which he held until illness compelled him to retire about four years ago.

Mr. Broughton was a member of the Knights of Pythias and the Modern Woodman of America. Mrs. Broughton died Oct. 25, 1934 and since that time Mr. Broughton has resided in the Jones home.

Regarded as one of the nation's greatest old time baseball catchers, Mr. Broughton was first engaged in organized baseball in 1881 and 1882 when he was a catcher with the Beloit and Janesville teams. In 1882 he started with Cleveland in the National league, but was purchased by Baltimore the same year. Milwaukee, in the Northwestern league, bought Broughton in 1884 when it won 27 of 28 games played. Ed Cushman, considered by Broughton as one of the greatest pitchers of all time, was with Milwaukee.

Broughton went to the St. Louis Browns in 1885, and was purchased by the Metropolitan of New York in August to catch Cushman, who had been bought from Milwaukee. Broughton went with Memphis in 1886, was back with Milwaukee in 1887, with Detroit in the old National league in 1888 and with St. Paul in 1889. He was transferred to Seattle in the North Pacific league in 1890, and played with Lowell, Mass., in 1891, the last days of his league career.

With him on the state championship team here in 1896 were Billy Sullivan, later of the Chicago White Sox, and Chet Brewer, who became University of Missouri athletic director.

Julia Williams Broughton, of Rockville, Maryland, passed away on January 22, 2009, at Shady Grove Hospital in Rockville, MD, following a brief illness. Julia was born in Evansville, WI, the eldest child of Dan and Mildred Williams. She grew up in Evansville. An accomplished musician, she played cornet in the Wisconsin State High School Band while attending Evansville High School.

She attended Green County Normal in Monroe, WI, received her teaching degree in 1940, and taught school for one year in Footville, WI. Through her classmate, Carol Broughton of Albany, she met Carol's brother Arthur Broughton. Julia and Arthur were married on December 23, 1943.

Following World War II, they lived in several cities in Wisconsin, including Racine, where Arthur was the managing editor of the Wisconsin Agriculturist. In 1958, they moved to Silver Spring, MD, where they remained until 1981, when they retired to a home on the Sugar River in Albany.

Julia's maintained a lifelong interest in music, playing piano and organ as well as singing in the choir of the Unitarian-Universalist Church in Silver Spring. She was a skilled seamstress, who made clothes for herself and her children, and later in life she became a weaver and wove beautiful fabrics, including ancient patterns from her ancestral Wales. Throughout her life she maintained a keen interest in social justice and helping the disadvantaged. In the 1960's, she was active in the civil rights movement working tirelessly to provide equal access to housing for African-American members of the U.S. military.

Following her husband Arthur's

death in 1999, Julia moved to Madison, WI, and enjoyed going to plays, book and jazz classes, and other activities. In 2008, She moved to Collingswood Nursing Home in Rockville, MD, near her daughter Elizabeth Broughton.

Julia is survived by her sister Ruth Heinzen, of St. Paul, MN; by her three children Arthur Broughton Jr. of Moss Beach, CA, William Broughton of Verona, WI, and Elizabeth Broughton of Takoma Park, MD; by her grandchildren Kevin Tenaglia of Walled Lake MI, Cody Broughton, currently in the U.S. Army in Iraq, Obadiah

Broughton of Boulder, CO, Christopher Broughton Bossong, of Washington, D.C., Aaron Broughton of McKinleyville, CA, and Cecily Broughton of Rohnert Park, CA.

Nichols St in Albany, WI on Sunday February 1, 1 p.m. – 3 p.m. A graveside ceremony will be held on Monday, February, 2, at 10 a.m. at Magnolia Cemetery, Magnolia, WI.
