BUMP.—On last Thursday morning Frank Bump, aged about 20 years, son of M. P. Bump, of Magnolia, while at work in the field was seized with heart disease or some kindred stroke and before help could be obtained, died. Much sorrow is manifested in the vicinity and the parents have the sympathy of a large circle of friends.

DIED.—March 23, 1889, at his home in the Town of Magnolia of paralysis, Mr. W. H. Bump, aged 63 years. Funeral at the house Monday at 1 o'clock p. m. A report reached us yesterday morning that the above named deceased had passed away, but upon enquiry of his relatives in this city, we learned that he was very low, but still alive last evening. We learn from the same source, Mr. F. W. Tolles, that he died this morning at 5:30 o'clock and his son is now in town for the purpose of securing Undertaker Potter to take charge of the remains. Mr. Bump has been a prominent farmer of the Town of Magnolia for over 30 years and has many relatives and friends throughout the country, who will regret his death very much.

From our frequent meetings with him we supposed that he was a usually healthy man of his age, and have but recently learned that he had been troubled for some time with a gradually increasing or creeping paralysis, which has finally taken him away.

The deceased had been in poor health for the past 18 years. She leaves to mourn her departure three daughters, Mesdames Geo. Thurman of this city, W. R. Webb, of Spencer, Iowa, and R. Anderson of Magnolia; and two sons, George of Albany, and Dwight of Decatur, Ill. Funeral services were conducted in the Magnolia Advent church, and the remains interred in the Magnolia cemetery. Mrs. Bump was known by many Evansville people, and friends extend sympathy to the bereaved family.

Mrs. John Cady, 64 Dies In California

**The Former Miss Ruth Bump
Local Seminary Graduate
Passes In West**

Word has been received here by Mr. and Mrs. Bert Bullard of the death of the latter's sister, Mrs. John Cady, 64, South Gate, Calif., former local resident and student at the old Evansville Seminary.

Mrs. Cady, formerly Miss Ruth Bump of Albany, died Saturday, Mar. 2, following a ten day illness. She was born in Magnolia township, June 17, 1881 and spent her girlhood on a farm nine miles west of Evansville. She later lived in Evansville with her grandmother and attended school here.

She was a graduate of the Evansville Seminary, State Teachers college in Whitewater and the University of Wisconsin. Following her graduation at Whitewater, she taught in rural schools before entering the university. After completing her work in Madison, she taught mathematics in Oregon for several years. She moved to California 23 years ago and Mr. Cady died there.

Mrs. Cady is survived by a son, Joseph in the service; two daughters, Mary and Catherine; a brother, Albert, Albany, and four sisters, Mrs. Bullard, Evansville; Mrs. Ivan Breylinger, Neenah; Mrs. Arthur Edmunds, Chetek, and Mrs. Henry Gardner, Delavan. Her parents, her husband, and a sister, Mrs. Phoebe Franklin, preceded her in death.

Dwight E. Bump, 79 Passes In Danville

**Former Local Resident Dies In
Home Following Illness Of
Three Years**

Dwight E. Bump, 79, Danville, Ill., a former local resident and retired conductor and brakeman of the Wabash railroad, died Saturday at his home. He had been in failing health for three years and suffered a stroke Friday night.

Services were at 3 p.m. Tuesday in the Sharer funeral home in Albany. The Rev. Ora Compton of the Methodist church officiated and burial was in Hillcrest cemetery.

A son of William Horace and Fannie Briggs Bump, he was born in August, 1868. He was educated in the rural schools and at the old Evansville seminary. Mr. Bump and Ina Eldred of Albany were married Jan. 29, 1894, and made their home in Chicago, Decatur and Danville, Ill. Mrs. Bump died Feb. 16, 1935. Mr. Bump later married Louise Cahill of Danville.

Surviving are his wife; and several nephews and nieces.
