#### MARRIED

The wedding bells rung merrily at the home of Mr. and Mrs. James Lincoln on Wednesday evening, Dec. 23rd, 1885, in the town of Union. It being the occasion of the marriage of their daughter, Miss Hattie, to Mr. Wendall A. Gleave, of Evansville. The young couple are among our most popular young people and are of genuine worth. At 8 o'clock, the wedding march was executed by Miss Minnie Whaley who presided at the instrument and the Rev. H. Sewell walked into the parlor followed by Mr. Ed Ahara and Miss Alice Gleave who in turn were followed by the bride and groom who placed themselves under an evergreen arch with the usual horse shoe emblem just over them and the few words were spoken by the minister which made them husband and wife. The prayer was made invoking God's blessing on the twain and the congratulations were hearty and heartfelt from the one hundred friends who were present. The groom was dressed in the conventional black suit and white necktie, and the bride was richly clothed in a heavy ashes of roses silk. The groomsman and bridesmaid looked as they are -- a handsome pair. The wedding supper was bountiful and the tables were arranged beautifully. Mr. Wm. Black had the full charge of them in arranging and directing and he certainly exhibited great taste and showed himself a master hand in the business. I never saw the like better managed. The presents were numerous, useful and beautiful. The young people will settle among the people whom they have known from childhood and we believe they will be happy.

The funeral was held from the Union church Sunday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock.

The deceased leaves an aged husband and several adopted children, never having any of their own, among whom are Mrs. Arthur Franklin, Mrs. Hattie Gleave and John Wall. She also lost her youngest adopted daughter, Minnie, a few years ago, who was a well known school teacher in this vicinity. She was a very kind mother and a friend to all who will be greatly missed from her home in Union.

## FLORIDA LETTER

The following letter written to Mr. H. A. Shreve of this city will no doubt be of interest to many readers of the Review:

I suppose you will be surprised to learn that I am in Florida. Myself and wife left Seattle the fore part of June and landed in Largo, Florida, on the 17th. Largo is situated on the Pineallas Peninsula on the southwest coast of Florida.

We are located about five miles from Largo, right among the thick pine woods. We are just half way between the Gulf of Mexico and old Tampa Bay, five miles from either one.

I like it here very much. It seems to be the healthiest country that we ever lived in, after you get acclimated.

We came here in one of the worst months of the year, and it came very near doing me up. I never was sicker in my life and no doctor at that time within reaching distance.

We have a 10-acre tract of land, got a nice little cabin and have one acre cleared, fenced and plowed, and partly planted to garden. The balance I shall plant in the latter part of this month or fore part of next. So you see we are not confined to any one season as you are in Wisconsin. They plant every month here, except May and June.

We have the finest fishing in this country that I ever saw anywhere. I can get any amount of oysters and fish of every kind within three miles of my place.
