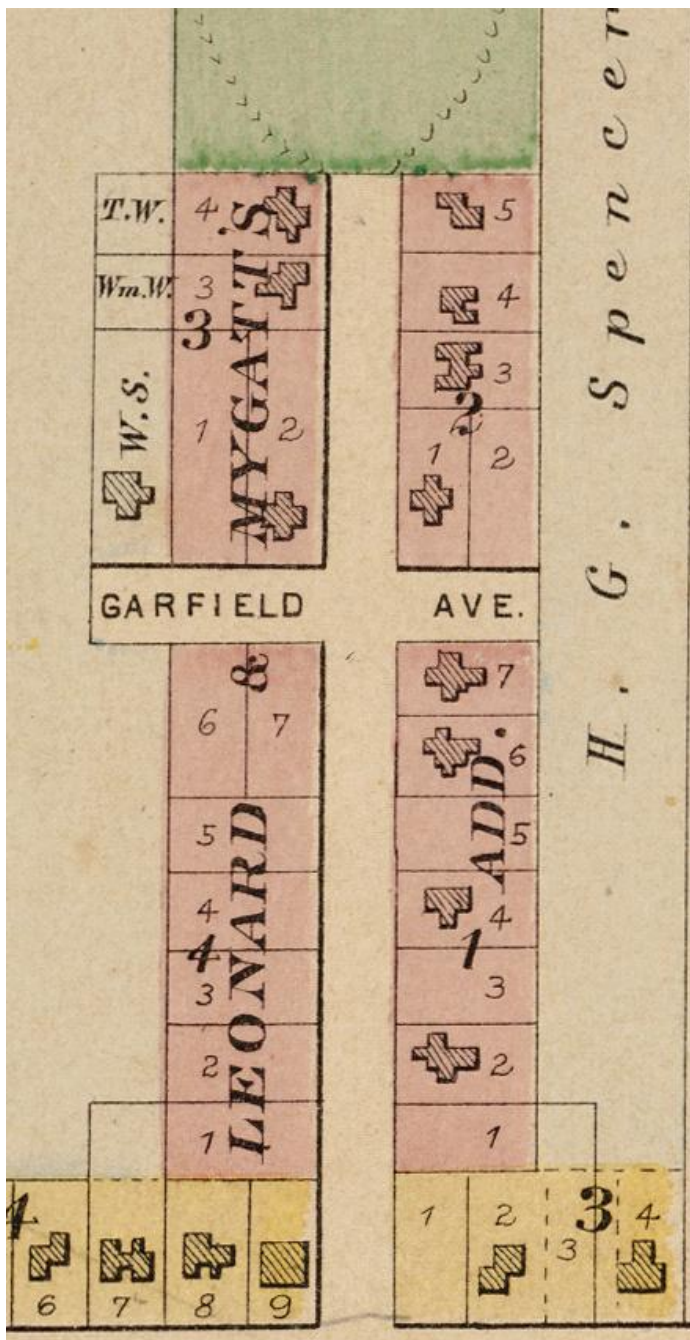

—By complaint of Thomas Aspel, Mr. John Hamelton was arrested, Wednesday, for violating Village Ordinance No. 3, which is for the prevention of drunkenness and disturbance of the peace. A jury consisting of Messrs J. W. Morgan, W. M. Clark, A. H. Fessenden, H. Monshau, W. H. Wainright and John Lemmel; after hearing the evidence pronounced Mr. Hamelton not guilty. Mr. Aspel's complaint was that Mr. H. was drunk and that his (Mr. Aspel's) cane lay on the Grange store platform and that he picked it up and in so doing and turning around the cane came in rather close proximity to Mr. Hamelton's face, unknown to him, when Mr. H. commenced threatening him with violence using profane and indecent language and he told Mr. H. to mind his own business for he was night watchman when Mr. H. struck him in the face, Dr. Quivey, stated that he heard, Mr. H. a talking rather loud and use some threats but that he did not consider that Mr. H. disturbed the peace.

Mrs. Hamilton finds time to work on the farm too. She daily cleans the milking equipment, sorts the eggs and occasionally climbs onto the tractor to give a hand. She cans and freezes the fruits of the garden.

Creative stitchery and reading and card playing are the ways in which Georgia Hamilton spends her leisure time. She writes poetry and sews most of her wardrobe.

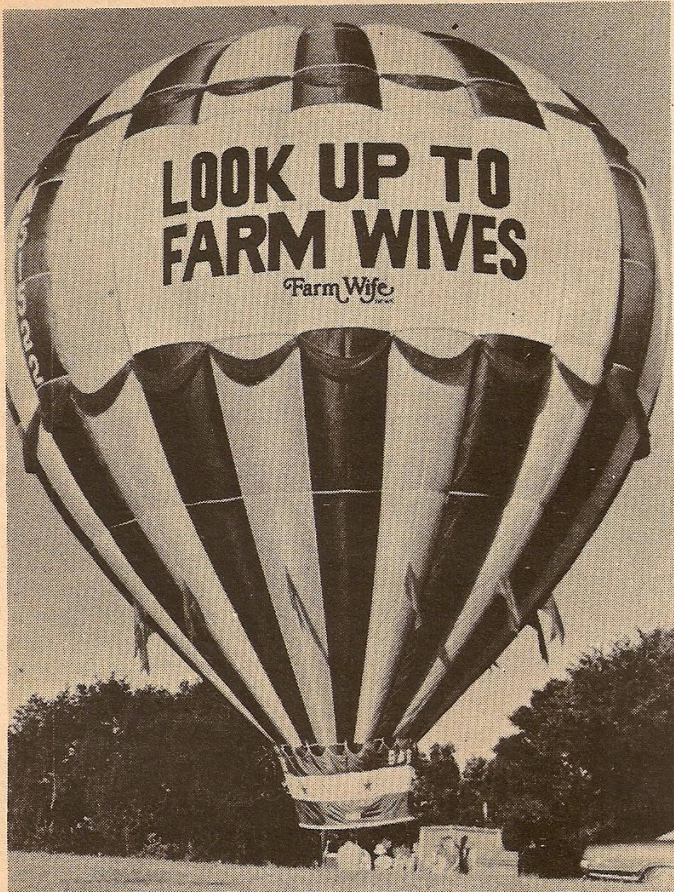
Summing it up, the article describes her as a "good neighbor" who helps in trouble and adds to celebrations. She is "happy being helpful."
