B. P. HANSEN, 63, DIES AFTER LONG ILLNESS

Funeral Services Will be Held Here Today With Burial in Maple Hill Cemetery

Bennie Peter Hansen, 63, a well-known Evansville farmer, died at 9 p.m. Tuesday in his home two and one-half miles north of the city following an illness of two weeks. He had been failing in health for the past year and one-half.

Funeral services will be held at 2 p.m. today in the Allen funeral home with the Rev. Grant V. Clark, pastor of the Congregational church, officiating. The song service will be presented by Kenneth Ellis. Burial will be made in Maple Hill cemetery with Oscar, Harvey, Palmer, and Harry Hansen, and John and William Jorgensen, all nephews, as pallbearers.

Mr. Hansen was born April 9, 1870 in Denmark coming to America in 1889 where he secured employment on a farm near Stoughton. He was

William P. Hansen, Member Of Local Police Force Has Heart Attack

William P. Hensen, 53, Evansville, died while fishing on the Rock river about three miles east of Edgerton Saturday afternoon.

It is believed that Hansen suffered a heart attack. He was fishing from a railroad bridge abutment over the river with a companion, Ray Holden.

Hansen fell into knee-deep water. Holden jumped in to help him and a summer resort resident, Richard Swon, Chicago, rushed to the scene in a boat. He was pronounced dead by an Evansville physician.

Funeral services were held at 2:30 Tuesday in the Allen funeral home with the Rev. Francis Kranz, pastor of the Congregational church, officiating. Burial was in Maple Hill cemetery.

Mr. Hansen was born June 18, 1896, in Stoughton and had lived most of his life in the vicinity of Evansville and Union. At one time he worked at the Chevrolet plant in Janesville, later joining the police force at Evansville.

Survivors are his mother, Mrs. Fred Hansen, Madison; three sisters, Mrs. Florence Patchin, Janesville, Mrs. Leslie Inman, Baraboo, and Mrs. Perry Burnett, Evansville; and a brother, Albert, Evansville.
