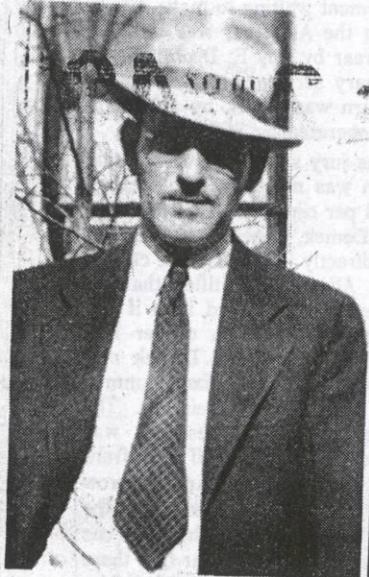

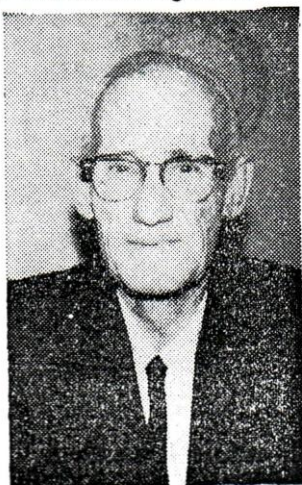
with his brother, Walter, in a barber shop here. He was formerly a member of the German Reformed Lutheran Church in New Glarus.
