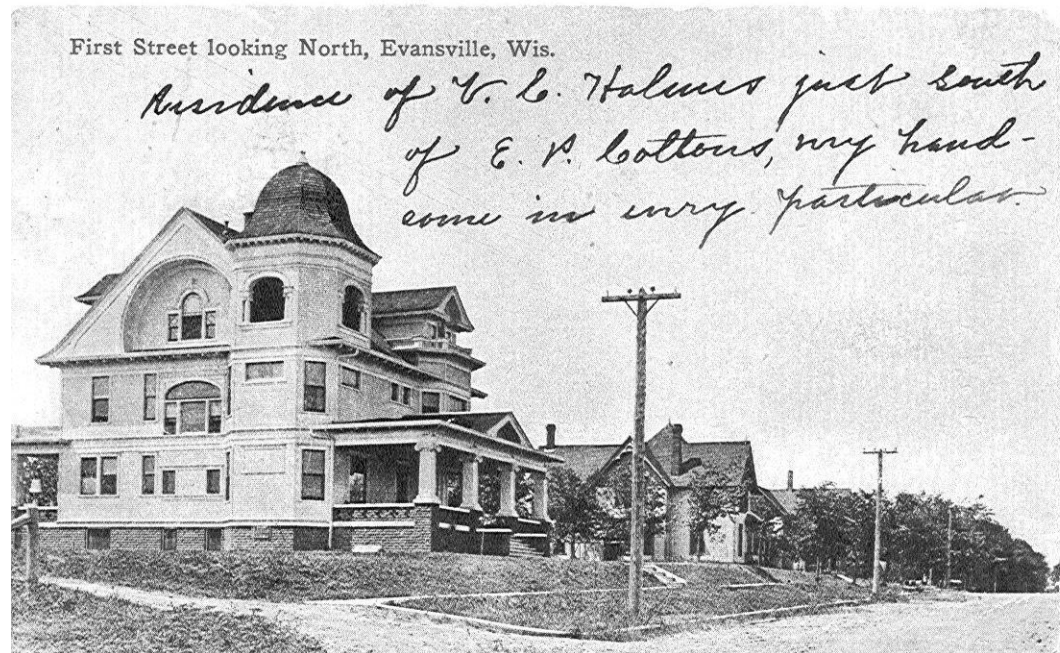

Postmaster A. C. Holmes, a life-long resident of Evansville, was graduated from the local high school with the class of 1909 and received the degree of Bachelor of Arts at Beloit college in 1913.

On leaving college he accepted a position in the hardware department of the Grange store here and was transferred to the furniture department in 1915 which position he held until 1927. Mr. Holmes was appointed acting postmaster on Aug. 1, 1927 to succeed Forest Durner, and was commissioned to that office on Jan. 4, 1928.

He is a past master of Union Lodge No. 32 F. and A. M., past high priest of the Evansville chapter No. 35 Royal Arch Masons, and president of the Evansville Country club. The postmaster served six years as treasurer of the Board of Education resigning that position in 1927 to accept his federal appointment.

Mr. Holmes, son of Albert Stiles Holmes and Sarah Cass Holmes, was born July 13, 1854 on a farm near Albany, west of Evansville. His parents, who were among the early settlers in that locality, were the first to be married in Albany township. The ceremony was performed July 26, 1846.

Mr. Holmes grew to young manhood in that locality and after completing his rural education there attended the Evansville seminary. He later taught school in his home district for a short time and then helped found the Grange store here in September, 1874.

Rated for many years with J. P. Porter and T. C. Richardson as the triumvirate or the big three in Evansville's commerce, Mr. Holmes was first employed in the butter and egg department of the Grange store and was later named manager of the hardware department.

He served as secretary of the store for many years and following his retirement from active service in 1911, he continued as an officer and director. While residing in Union township in the home now occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Devine, Mr. Holmes served as town treasurer for several years and was also president and secretary of the Rock County Fair association. He took an active part in Evansville's civic affairs and continued that interest until his death.

Mr. Holmes and his family have spent the summer months at the Holmes lodge on Long lake for the past several years. He was married to Miss Phila Ann Chase, Albany, at a ceremony performed Jan. 22, 1881 and since their marriage they have made their home in Evansville.

Though not a member, Mr. Holmes was a staunch supporter of the Congregational church which he attended in former years. His business policy was broad and he abided faithfully by the Golden Rule standard in all of his dealings which went far in establishing the stable foundation of the Grange store which for many years was heralded as the largest department store in Wisconsin outside of Milwaukee.
