William Hyne Succumbs in Home at 7 p.m. Tuesday After A Lingering Illness

William Hyne, 65, nearly a life-long resident of Evansville, died in his home, 213 South Madison street at 7 p.m. Tuesday, following a lingering illness. He had been failing in health for the past four years. Funeral services will be held at 2:30 p.m. tomorrow in the home with the Rev. Robert H. Pratt officiating. Burial will be in Maple Hill cemetery.

Mr. Hyne, a son of Charles and Nancy Hyne, was born May 8, 1864 on the old Hyne farm three miles west of the city on the county line. He was married to Mrs. Adella B. Wilson, of New York state, in Fremont, Nebr. Feb. 4, 1888 returning to Wisconsin a year later.

Mr. Hyne was employed by the D. E. Wood Butter company here for 35 years retiring four years ago on account of poor health. He lived an eminently useful life and was a member of the Baptist church and the Modern Woodmen.

With the Eighth Army in Kobe (Special) August 7, 1947—Pfc. Merrel E. Hyne, 19, son of Mrs. Eva Hyne, 326 South First Street, Evansville, Wisconsin, is presently on duty with the Eighth Army in Kobe, Honshu, Japan.

Kobe, Japan's second largest port, is being utilized by the occupation army as a supply base. Before the war Kobe was Japan's import and export center. Surrounded by mountain ranges of unusual scenic beauty, it has been called one of the garden spots of Japan.

Colorful, crowded and cosmopolitan Kobe still manages to retain the oriental flavor, which made it one of the queen cities of Japan before the war.

One of the unique spots in Kobe where Pfc. Hyne will continue to receive part of his army training is the Kobe Base rifle range. This range is located on the grounds of the Emperors Imperial Palace. The palace, destroyed during raids on Japan, has been removed, and the range built near the spot where it stood formerly. At the present time Pfc.
