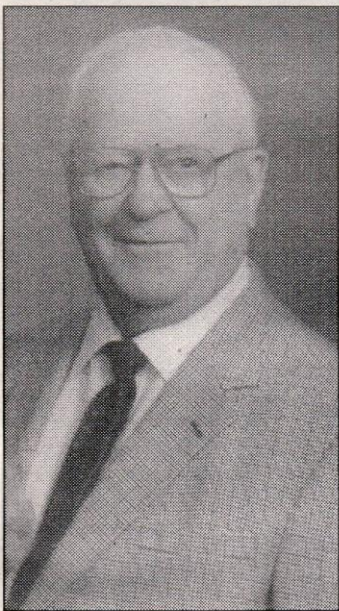
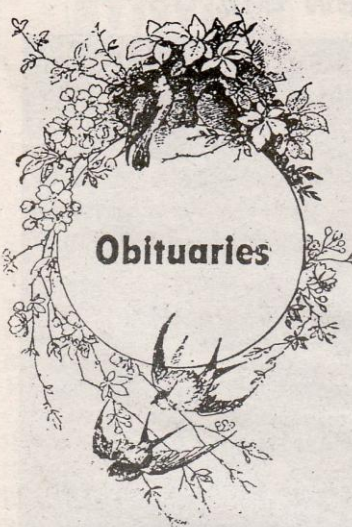
Edwin Stanley Julseth, age 83, lifelong Evansville area resident, died Tuesday, November 24, 1998 at Stoughton Hospital.
