# EVANSVILLE SHOWS BUSINESS GROWTH

**New Power Plant Is Built;  
Community Fire Truck  
Is Bought**

Evansville — During the year 1930 Evansville, as ever, has gone forward. The unemployment situation has had no marked effect on this city. There are very few unemployed. At the Baker Manufacturing company, business conditions were normal to the middle of the year, suffering some reductions later. Improvements have been many, but not extensive. The Wisconsin Power and Light company installed a large new substation to furnish the power for the city. It was started in May and finished in September. Five hundred feet of water main was laid on South Madison street, the Albany road. In February a \$5,500 triple combination community fire truck was purchased by the city and the surrounding country within direct telephone distance. The Farmers and Merchants State bank increased its capital stock to \$50,000 at its annual meeting in January. Liew VanWart was elected president.

Miss Theresa Erickson purchased Magee's Beauty shop from Mrs. Charlotte Magee, who purchased a shop in Monroe. John Medler moved his garage from North Madison street to the Croak building. J. F. Jensen opened a garage in the building vacated by Mr. Medler. Clifford Keylock, Madison, opened an automotive shop on North Madison street. Mrs. J. H. Meier purchased the millinery shop of the late Miss Sadie Copeland. Lester Thompson purchased Mrs. Jay Emery's, Madison property on South Madison street, this city and nearly completed a new brick filling station. In June George W. Huebner, Oconomowoc, leased the Magee Opera house from Mr. and Mrs. George Magee, renaming it the Rex. He installed talking picture equipment and remodeled it.
