### A Sad Death

Mr. Wm. Milbrandt, a prosperous farmer, aged 35 years, residing about three miles south of this city, was instantly killed Wednesday morning at 9 o'clock, by the falling of an embankment of stone and dirt upon him while he was directing the clearing away of some loose dirt. Although Mr. Milbrandt's regular occupation is that of a farmer, he had been drawing stone from a quarry near his home at intervals this summer to the city, and we are informed that on this fatal morning he went there with Geo. Bidwell, Jr., of this city, and was directing him in the best manner to clear away some loose dirt and stone to make access to the quarry more convenient, when the embankment fell upon him causing the fatal result. Mr. Bidwell, who stood near by shoveling, was buried nearly to the waist, but soon extricated himself and went to the assistance of Mr. Milbrandt, whom he found entirely buried and dead, and he at once went for assistance. Upon the recovery of Mr. Milbrandt's remains they were found terribly crushed, so that nearly every limb of his body was broken as well as his back twice, and internal organs were protruding through the flesh at different parts of the body, so great was the pressure which crushed him developing a very sickening sight.

Dr. Evans and Colony were called and a coroner's jury who made examinations and decided as stated. The unfortunate man leaves a heart broken young wife with five small children; but fortunately he carried \$2,000 life insurance, \$1,000 in the New York Life company, and \$1,000 in the Aetna company which will undoubtedly be promptly paid.

The funeral was held today, Friday, at the house at 12 o'clock, and at 1 o'clock at the M. E. church in this city; Rev. F. T. Eilert, resident German minister, and Rev. W. Rollins, resident M. E. minister officiating. Interment in the Evansville cemetery by undertakers Young & Meinke and Jas. Powles sexton. The family are receiving the sympathy and comfort of many warm friends.

Mr. and Mrs. Lee Milbrandt, route 3, this city, received a telegram from the government last Friday stating that their son, Howard, A. Milbrandt, was missing while performing the duty of his country.

The eighteen year old marine enlisted on January 2 of this year and was stationed in San Diego, California, until about July 1 when he was transferred to a foreign port. He wrote his parents on July 15 that he was south of the equator but was not permitted to divulge his location. Early in August Mr. and Mrs. Milbrandt were notified that their son had reached his destination safely.

Howard was graduated from the Evansville high school in 1941 and was a student in the Green County Normal school at Monroe until his enlistment. He has a brother and sister in the armed forces of the United States. Pfc. Gordon Milbrandt is stationed at Midland, Texas, and Lieut. Lois Milbrandt, is an army registered nurse at Scottsville, Ballsville Ill.

### Letters Arrive Tuesday From Howard Milbrandt Located In Solomon Islands

The following letter was received Tuesday from Howard Milbrandt, son of Mr. and Mrs. Lee Milbrandt, who was reported missing in action south of the equator seven weeks ago. Mr. and Mrs. Milbrandt received two letters Tuesday from their son, one written August 26, on a small scrap of paper, which he folded together and sealed with Scotch tape because he had no envelope. The message contained herein said only that he was in the Solomon Island area and was well.

The other letter was written September 17, and was sent by V-Mail. Both letters were censored by the war department.

Dear Mom and Dad and all:

I am well and doing fine. We have met the Japs here in the Solomon Island area. They can't fight worth a damn. I'm on Tulagi Island now and have been for some time.

Most of the trouble with the enemy in this area has been completely subdued. I have the ocean for my front yard and the jungles out in back.

The chow is pretty good now. I am keeping a diary of things I do daily. I haven't received any mail from home since June 27.

We have an awfully large number of working parties and I'm getting a good sun tan out of the deal. Rumor has it that we are going to be home for Christmas. Bye for now and loads of love.

Show this to Lois and Betty and Ethel as I have not enough V mail blanks to write to all of them. Don't worry about me and write often as I will get it all eventually, I hope. Love to the kids.

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# Sailor Well Known Here Escapes Death

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John Cesar, Husband of Former  
Local Girl Is Rescued By  
English Tanker

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Escaping death when torpedoes  
blasted in two the cargo ship on which  
he was a naval gunner's mate, third  
class, John Cesar, 20, husband of the  
former Betty Lee Milbrandt, this city,  
recently arrived in Rockford, Ill., to  
spend a three weeks furlough with his  
wife and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. John  
Cesar. His story is one of the most  
thrilling of the war's sea battles.

Somewhere in the Atlantic early last  
month, Cesar's ship, loaded with ex-  
posives was suddenly struck by a tor-  
pedo which hurled everybody on board  
to the deck. A moment later a second  
torpedo blasted the ship in two, the en-  
tire section from the midship on, van-  
ishing. There was not a survivor from  
the crew aft of the midship.

Stationed at his gun in the bow, Ce-  
sar leaped into the water. Less than  
four minutes after the first blast the  
entire ship had disappeared beneath  
the waves. Its rapid sinking was prob-  
ably the reason there were some sur-  
vivors, for flames which were raging  
might have reached explosives in the  
hold, he stated.

After plunging over the side, the  
sailor managed to cling to a life raft
