house.

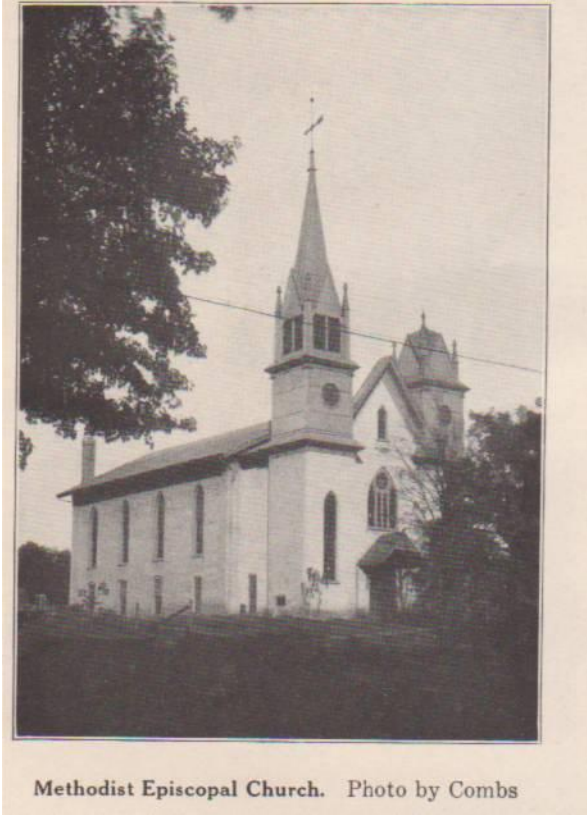

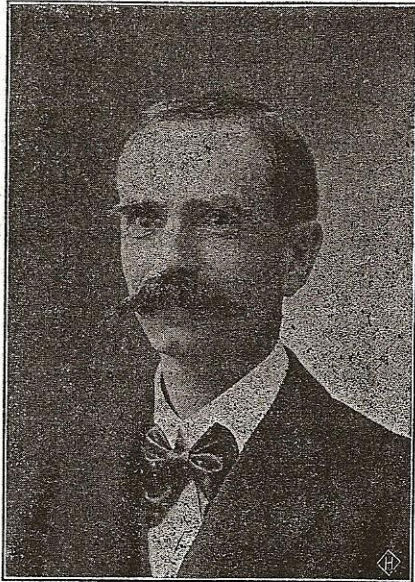

Former Evansville Minister Succumbs

Rev. T. W. North Dies In Home
Of Daughter In California
Last Week

The Rev. T. W. North, 85, former pastor of the Evansville Methodist church died last week at his home in Sebastopol, Calif. Funeral services and burial took place at Santa Rosa, Calif. May 18.

The Rev. Mr. North was the son of Thomas and Sarah North, English emigrant, who located on Albion Prairie about 1846. He was born August 11, 1857 and grew up on his father's farm attending the Busseyville district school. He was graduated from the Albion academy in 1876 and from Lawrence college in 1881. He was married to Miss Josie E. Wales in 1882.

Other churches he served in this locality were Stoughton, Deerfield, Edgerton, Magnolia, Milton, Lima, and Milton Junction. Although he retired from the ministry in 1927, he later served a union church in Omro for several years.

The survivors are his wife, three daughters; two brothers, Willard and Fred North, both of Edgerton, and two sisters. The Rev. and Mrs. North made their home with their daughter, Mrs. Hazel Widdows, in Calif.

A grandson, Vincent North, was killed in a plane crash last February 18.
