Mrs. Alma Lovejoy

Mrs. Alma Lovejoy, 71, died at 6:40 a. m. Friday in the home of her sister, Mrs. Charles Weary, two and a half mile east of Evansville, after several months illness.

Mrs. Lovejoy, formerly Alma Story, was born January 30th, 1857, at Story, six miles west of Oregon. Early in youth she united with the Baptist Church and always remained a devotional Christian. When she was eighteen years old the family moved onto a farm two and a half miles east of Evansville. She then did practical nursing and later conducted a bakery business in Evansville.

In October 1901, Alma Story married D. B. Lovejoy who died in December 1924. They lived in Evansville excepting the summers which were usually spent in their mountain home in Colorado. Mrs. Lovejoy had spent the past four months in the home of her sister.

The deceased is survived by her sister, Mrs. Charles Weary; a brother Charles Story, Beaver Dam; a step daughter, Mrs. Lorena Stewart of Hudson; a step son, Eugene Lovejoy, Grand Forks, North Dakota; a step grand son and four nephews.

Funeral services were held Sunday at 2:30 p. m. in the Maple Hill Cemetery.

Mrs. Story of Evansville Dead; Ill Five Months

Evansville—Mrs. Charles story, 58, a resident of this city for many years, died at her home, 305 South Madison street, at 10:30 p. m. Sunday after a five months' illness. She had been in failing health for some time.

The former Hattie Margie Yager was born in Richland county, Jan. 19, 1879, the daughter of Lee Yager and Nancy Ayers Yager. She attended the rural schools there. In the spring of 1901, she came to Evansville to make her home and was married to Charles E. Story July 30 of that year. They always lived in Evansville with the exception of a few years in Portland, Ore., and Beaver Dam. Mr. Story has fully recovered from his accident here last summer when he was struck by a through train.

Mrs. Storey was a member of the Portland Women's Relief Corps and the Evansville Rebekah lodge. She was a woman of outstanding courage and fortitude and during her last serious illness was patient and cheerful and sang hymns for 15 minutes the day of her death.

Survivors are her husband; her aged mother, Mrs. Nancy Yager Barr, Boscobel; her sisters and brothers, Mrs. Bert Turner, Wauzeka, Mrs. Walter Stoker, Oakland, Calif., Mrs. R. J. Campbell, Woodman, Wis., Albert Barr, Waucoma, Ia., Edwin Barr, Boscobel, Mrs. Alex Fischer, Beaver Dam, and Mrs. Eulalia McCarthy, Madison.

Funeral services will be held at 1:30 p. m. Tuesday in the local Baptist church, the Rev. L. M. Kitzmiller, officiating. Pallbearers will be Marvin Paterson, J. T. Waller, Henry Miller, Ray Hubbard, Alvie Scoville and Charles Seguine. Burial will be in Maple Hill cemetery. The Women's Relief Corps will attend in a body.
