INTO THE JAWS OF DEATH.

A Horrible Accident. A Boy 8 Years of Age had His Head Cut Completely off by the Cars.

A few minutes to twelve o'clock Saturday, Sept. 21st, while the down freight train was standing at the depot, with the rear portion reaching up to Main St. crossing, or rather the rear portion of the train had become detached and stood upon the track. A couple of little boys were playing "horse," upon the track, directly behind these detached cars. After the work of switching had been accomplished, the train men backed up the balance of the cars to hitch on, and running against these loose ones, set them whirling backward. One of the little boys was thrown aside and escaped unhurt, but not so with Harry, only son of Mr. & Mrs. Alf. Whaley, who fell directly upon the track, the rear wheels passing completely across his neck, severing it in a moment. Several persons stood near and witnessed the whole accident, but it was done so quickly that no one had power to avert it.

Mr. C. H. Wilder was the first to reach in between the wheels and draw the body out. But death had been there before, although the work was done in a moment.

The body was taken to Mrs. Lewis' house and there dressed for interment.

The whole scene was in full view of the house he had just a few moments before left in all the innocence and sportiveness of youth, perfectly unconscious of the terrible fate that a few moments brought upon him. His parents were agonized with grief.

Little Harry was a member of Mr. Potter's Infant Class in the Methodist Sunday School. His funeral took place from that church Sunday morning. Six little boys acting as bearers—Clark Plaisted, Fred Baker, Willie Campbell, Ebbie Landon, Charley Lehman, Henry Winston. Following the hearse was the balance of the class, led by their teacher, Mr. Homer Potter, and in the rear was the school, friends and citizens.
