EVANSVILLE AID SOCIETY.—*Editor's Gazette*:—We believe that when we give alms or perform deeds of charity, we should not let our left hand know what our right hand doeth; nevertheless the people of this flourishing village wish to be in vogue; therefore will we let our deeds be known.

Nearly all the inhabitants of this place and vicinity are members of the Evansville Aid Society, yet the average attendance at the Society during the past year does not exceed ten. Notwithstanding they have responded nobly to every call for the sick and wounded soldiers, a great deal more might have been done.

Since December 1st, 1863, there has been received into the Treasury \$143 37. During that time there has been forwarded to the Chicago Sanitary Commission the following Sanitary goods (avoiding details for the sake of brevity) viz.: One box of sanitary goods, dried fruit, beef, pickles, &c., worth \$46,86. Six barrels of pickled potatoes, worth \$60,00. Two barrels of eggs, worth \$18,25. Four barrels of onions, worth \$15,15. Also one box of like and other sanitary goods and reading matter, worth \$64,87.

There are some funds yet remaining in the Treasury, which will soon be converted into necessaries and comforts for our noble soldiers. Yours, &c.
