Mr. and Mrs. Edward J. Ellis, prominent Evansville farmers, were guests of honor at the annual Thanksgiving dinner of the Butts Corners Community club held Sunday in the rural school, four miles northwest of the city. The occasion was their twenty-fifth wedding anniversary which occurred Wednesday.

Mr. and Mrs. Ellis were married Nov. 20, 1915 at a ceremony performed in the latter's home, one mile east of Brooklyn, by the Rev. J. W. Barnett, pastor of the Brooklyn Methodist church at that time. Mrs. Ellis was formerly Miss Sadie Ames, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. F. M. Ames.

Following their marriage Mr. and Mrs. Ellis settled on the Ellis homestead, five miles northwest of Evansville, and have resided there since that time. Mr. Ellis represents the third generation to occupy the family homestead.

Mrs. Ellis was graduated from the three-year course at the Brooklyn high school after which she completed her senior year in Evansville. She was later graduated from the State Teachers' college, Whitewater, after which she taught in the public schools at Fond du Lac. She is an active member of the Brooklyn Community church and the Butts' Corners Community club and is a talented vocalist.

Mr. Ellis is a graduate of the Agricultural short course at the University of Wisconsin and is prominent in agricultural circles. He is well-known throughout southern Wisconsin as a breeder of purebred Percheron horses.

The Thanksgiving program at the Butts Corners school attended by 70 guests Sunday included vocal duets by the Misses Alice and Carol Peach accompanied by their mother, Mrs. Roy Peach; a reading, "The Wedding Fee," by Mrs. Lloyd F.
