A new dray appeared upon our streets for the first time, one day last week, and learned that the O'Reilly boys were doing the business. This is a legitimate and lawful, and they have a perfect right to do it. Mr. W. F. Williams has run the business here for the last year or two, and done it very acceptably to our business men and community, in price and promptness, so far as we know. From an injury received while loading his dray a year ago, nearly incapacitated him for business, and he is obliged to hire a driver most of the time; but he has kept the business going, early and late and in all kinds of weather, when there was anything to do. We shall be sorry to see him entirely supplanted, and we believe he will not be, but that the demand will so increase the business as to give both drays a fair chance. But where a business is limited, opposition serves to impair both, rather than to increase the efficiency of either.

Liquor Suits,

Andrew Barton and Emmett Reilly were arrested yesterday charged with the illegal sale of liquor, both plead not guilty. Mr. Reilly's trial was set for Thursday, and Mr. Barton's for Saturday. Nate Ballard, Anse Gilbertson, Arthur Sayles, Anthony Richardson, Fred Clinch and Herb Van Patten were examined as witnesses in the cases. Ballard swore that he bought ginger ale at Bartons. Gilbertson swore that he bought whiskey at Bartons for Addison Barnum. Sayles swore that he bought 1/2 pint of cider of Barton for which he paid 25 cents and gave it to Addison Barnum. Richardson swore that he had bought no liquor of either of the defendants. Clinch swore that he had purchased beer of both of the defendants for which he paid 5 cents a glass. Herbert Van Patten swore the same.

The death of Cyrus J. Mitchell Wednesday afternoon removes another old settler from our midst. His death while not wholly unexpected was sorrowful for the fact that the last few days of his life were not devoid of pain and suffering and when the final end came, it was felt that his troubles were over.

To the last he retained his senses, and before the final hour came he seemed to have a premonition of his death. At 3 o'clock Wednesday afternoon he remarked that when the six o'clock whistles blew he would pass away, and just as the time came, he took his final sleep.

Mr. Mitchell was born in Jefferson county N. Y., April 1, 1821 and therefore was 82 years of age. He came to Wisconsin in 1844 and located on a farm east of the city, where he remained a number of years. In 1882 he married his present wife Mrs. Amanda Cornelius, who survives him. Besides a wife he leaves two sons by a former wife Rev. J. C. Mitchell of Lebanon N. H., and Dr. G. R. Mitchell of Richland Center, with these are Mrs. J. E. Reilly and Mrs. R. M. Antes step daughters who feel keenly the loss of a kind husband and father.

Funeral services are to be held at the house Saturday morning at 9:30. The Rev. James Churm officiating, assisted by the Rev. Mrs. Copp.
