Mrs. Reilly, formerly Miss Catherine Cornelius, was born March 25, 1864 in Perrysburg, O., and in February, 1876, when she was 12 years old, she moved with her parents to Evansville where she grew to young womanhood and attended the public schools and the Methodist church.

She was married some 50 years ago to John E. Reilly who operated a city transfer business here, and about 30 years ago Mr. and Mrs. Reilly moved to Beloit. Mr. Reilly died there Dec. 7, 1923 and Mrs. Reilly's only sister, Mrs. Antes, passed away Sept. 24, 1929.

Burr Thomas Reilly, 56, former Evansville resident, died suddenly of a heart attack at 4 a.m. Sunday in Milwaukee. He was the son of the late Emmett Reilly and Mrs. Lida Reilly. Funeral services were held in Milwaukee at 2 p.m. Wednesday.

Mr. Reilly was born in Evansville September 9, 1887. He grew up and received his education in this city and moved with his parents to Milwaukee about 35 years ago. He served in World War 1 with the 23rd Engineers Illinois Regiment. He was a member of the Masonics lodge and for more than thirty years was employed by the Acheson Colloids corporation of Port Huron, Michigan.

The deceased is survived by his mother; a sister, Mrs. Kittie Pillsbury, and two nieces, Miss Ruth Jones and Mrs. Joseph Sara, all of Milwaukee.
