**Charles Sperry Dies Saturday
In Church Street Residence;
Buried Here Monday**

Charles Willis Sperry, 82, a lifelong resident of the community, died at 1:20 a.m. Saturday in his home at 137 West Church street following a major operation three weeks' ago in Mercy hospital, Janesville. He had been failing in health for sometime but his condition was not considered critical until he was admitted to the hospital. He had returned from the hospital a week before his death.

Funeral services were held at 2 p.m. Monday in the Allen funeral home with Elder H. W. Woodstock, pastor

Mr. Sperry, son of Charles B. and Mary Jollenbeck Sperry, pioneers of Rock county, was born on a farm in Porter township Dec. 4, 1856 and was married to Miss Ida May Carle, Oil City, Pa., at a ceremony performed in Janesville Feb. 9, 1886. They observed their fifty-third wedding anniversary last Thursday.

Following their marriage Mr. and Mrs. Sperry resided on their farm in Porter township coming to Evansville 32 years ago. Mr. Sperry was employed here at the L. A. Baldwin feed mill for many years and later at the plant of the Baker Manufacturing company from which work he retired several years ago. He was a member of the Reorganized Church of Latter Day Saints.

Besides his wife and a host of friends throughout the city, Mr. Sperry's only survivor is a brother, Frank Sperry, Evansville.
