

Camp Indian Trails Opens Sunday

The 14th camping season at Camp Indian Trails, Boy Scouts of America gets underway Sunday June 12. The camp staff of 22 young men moved into camp for a weeks training before the arrival of campers Sunday, June 19.

The camp has been completely renovated, every building painted inside and out all tent platforms are painted or stained. Tents are all in place, and final set up procedures are to be completed this week also.

E. A. Bersch will again serve as camp director. This is the 17th year in that capacity at another camp before coming to Indian Trails. The camp staff has 14 of the 22 men back from last year or previous years. The program director will be Gerald McGowan, Emerald Grove. McGowan attends Luther College in Decorah, Iowa. Dan Boylen, of Janesville will be unit leader. Boylan attends Yale University. John Weckerly, Janesville is also a unit leader as is Steve Clark, of Janesville. Weckerly attends the University of Wisconsin, Clark is at Janesville High School. He is at Badger State this week as is Phil Olson a unit assistant. Don Holloway, Grant Bell and Ken Feldman are also unit assistants.

Alan Ellis reports to the Review some of his experiences at the Boy Scout Jamboree which he and Chet Des Rocheres Jr. attended for 18 days this summer. Alan is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Ellis and Chet the son of Mr. and Mrs. Chet Des Rocheres.

They traveled by bus and started their journey at Camp Indian Trails, Janesville on July 17. There were 80 boys who attended from Rock County. Reservations had been made a year ago by these boys who paid their own expenses for the trip. Their two big stops on the way out were at Omaha and Denver. The Jamboree camp was 75 miles from Denver and 10 miles from Colorado Springs and the new Air Force Academy. It included 2000 acres situated on a big plain with beautiful mountains serving as a background. One of the famous peaks is Pikes Peak.

This camp was officially set up by the army at a cost of \$200,000, with water system, electricity, roads and six P.X. stations. The equipment used was rented. Troops of about 40 and patrols with nine boys each formed. Two boys bunked together in each tent.

About \$20,000 worth of fireworks and movie and T.V. celebrities furnished the entertainment for the opening night. Skits, songs, Scout Demonstrations around the Camp Fires made this a very festive evening.

Various trips were taken to the Royal Gorge, Denver and the new Air Force Academy. Most of the eighteen days there, were spent in routine camp activity and getting acquainted with their fellow scouts from other countries. What a fine experience of neighborly goodwill was given, even in this short time, to boys at an impressionable age.

Boy Scouts came from all the States in the Union plus 30 Foreign countries including the U.S. They wore their Scouts uniforms and badges of their own countries. With more than 85,000 Boy Scouts gathering over the world in peace and harmony this Jamboree will go down in the records as a fine example of what can be done in brotherly love and friendship.

He continued as Scoutmaster for several years and was followed by the late Arthur H. Devine, who served about 15 years after which George Greenway, who resides here on North First Street, became Scoutmaster and served for many years. Since that time, many Evansville public spirited citizens have served in that position including Francis Erdman, the present master.

The Lions Club has been the sponsoring organization here the past 45 years and through the interest taken by all Lion members, the efficiency of the Scoutmasters and the cooperation of Evansville parents and their sons, Boy Scouting in Evansville is becoming a tradition.
